Riverside Camp 18 Named Co-Best New Camp at National Encampment

The General George Stoneman, Jr. Camp 18 of Riverside was named the Co-Best New Camp of the Year during the 130th National Encampment held at Reston, VA on August 11 – 13. The award was made by outgoing National C-in-C Brad Schall, and accepted by Department Secretary-Treasurer Phil Caines on behalf of Camp 18.

Ten delegates from the Department of California & Pacific witnessed our own C-in-C Brad Schall pass the gavel to incoming C-in-C Dr. Donald Palmer of Missouri. Brother Perley E. Mellor of Massachusetts has moved up to the SVC office, and Brother Ken Freshly of Ohio was elected as JVC. Since Brother Freshly resigned his seat on the Council of Administration to assume the JVC role, there were two election openings for COA members. Brother Donald L. Martin was elected from his post as National Patriotic Instructor to fill the 3-year seat on the COA; and Brother Steve Hammond, PDC Department of the Chesapeake (Maryland), was elected to the one-year COA slot. Brother Kevin Tucker, PDC of the Department of Massachusetts, was unsuccessful in his bid for one of the COA seats.

The other appointed National Officers and Committees can be found by viewing the list on the National website as soon as it is updated. C-in-C Palmer has issued three General Orders since his election that can be found and read at http://www.suvcw.org/go/go.htm . Several changes to the Constitution & Regulations were passed at the Encampment, and a quick way to review them is to view the red highlighted changes in the C&R document at http://www.suvcw.org/ftp/BlueBook2011.pdf.

The tour offered by the National Encampment Host Committee was of the Manassas Battlefield National Park. The tour was guided by world-renowned Civil War historian Ed Bearss. Unfortunately, the limited bus

seating for the tour sold out quickly, and your reporter was not able to attend. Fortunately, your reporter and his wife were able to take a selfguided tour of the Henry Hill portion of the battlefield later in the afternoon when the park was free of other tourists. The quiet calm and peace of the scene was greatly appreciated. We even got to hear some information from Ed Bearss, but it was at the Marine Corps Museum where he has a recording to describe his experience as a Navy Corpsman with the Marines during World War 2.

As you all know by now, the National Encampment in 2012 will be in Los Angeles, and in 2013 it will be hosted by the Department of Wisconsin in Milwaukee.



The Passing of Brother Bob Drennan

Dear Friends and Family,

My father passed away last Sunday, September 4 at about 6-7 pm, at UCI Medical Center. He had had surgery and was apparently recovering well, when he suddenly crashed on Sunday. The doctors do not actually know the cause yet.

Bob Drennan was an AMAZING man!! Full of integrity, character, honest, loyal, had no fear, pushed the envelope with everything he did. He is my Dad. The man rose to any challenge and usually conquered it better than anyone could have imagined. "Go for the throat!" he'd say.

He touched the lives of all he met. I remember going places with him like the lab to get blood work. We had just walked in, and I hear, "Bob!" shouted from inside the lab. Who got to cut ahead of all the other patients waiting?? Bob did. This used to drive my mother crazy. She'd say, "How do you know them?" (Well, Dad would get Mom in ahead of the others too, which she liked just fine.) His winning personality always made an impression.

We are planning a Celebration of Life. He wasn't very religious so it will be an informal time of paying respects and sharing memories with family and friends.

Dad was a great storyteller. He'd tell stories about any topic whether it be childhood hyjinks, family history, racing, or just a day at the office with enthusiasm and flair. Each of you has stories of how you met Bob, stories he told you, or just your own fascinating "Bob stories" of time you spent together. Dad usually called this "BSing". Which he could do for HOURS! I've had to sit and wait so I am not exaggerating.

Memorial Day

The Sons of Camp 17 and Daughters of Tent 88 again joined forces with the Santa Ana-Tustin-Orange Tri-City Veterans and Service Organizations to help sponsor and organize the Memorial Day observance at Santa Ana Cemetery. The theme for this year was "Lest We Forget – Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans". Veterans of the American Legion and VFW Posts and their Auxiliaries of the three cities along with Elks BPO, Emblem Club, and Lions Club took lead roles in the organization and presentation of the ceremony. Our southern cousins in the Sons of Confederate Veterans also participated in both the planning and performance of the observance. Our Brothers and Sisters of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution were well represented. Santa Ana High School NJROTC Cadet Commander Hector Mendez read President Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

As in past years the ceremony started at 10:00 AM on Monday, May 30 at the GAR plot near the Santa Clara Avenue entrance to the cemetery. Musical tributes were provided by the Chamber Singers of Orange High School along with martial airs performed by Civil War era fifer-drummer Stephen Schmitt who is a longtime friend of the SUVCW. The color guard/honor guard of Orange VFW Post provided a rifle salute, and Civil War re-enactors of Battery B-1st Pennsylvania Light Artillery (Cooper's Battery) and the CSA Richmond Howitzers fired three cannon salutes. All participating organizations presented their colors and each laid a wreath at the Monument to the Unknown Dead of the Civil War in the GAR Plot.

The honored guests this year were Congressman Ed Royce, County Supervisor Janet Nguyen, and Tustin Mayor Jerry Amante. The keynote speaker was Santa Ana VFW Post member Major Billy C. Hall (US Army-Ret.) who served as an enlisted Marine during WW2, and in the Army in Korea and Vietnam.

A special remembrance of appreciation was extended to two Orange VFW Post veterans who were active participants in many of the past Memorial Day ceremonies. They were Louis Ochoa and John Whiteriver, who both passed away earlier this year.

The Orange County Cemetery District and Santa Ana Cemetery provided gravesite flags for the veterans' graves at the cemetery, and Boy and Girl Scouts from the Orange County Council accompanied by volunteers placed the flags at the gravesites starting at 8:00 AM on Saturday, May 28.

Camp 17 Brothers attended other Memorial Day ceremonies including; Fairhaven Memorial Park, Magnolia Memorial Park in Garden Grove, Harbor Lawn Cemetery in Costa Mesa, Anaheim Cemetery, and Loma Vista Memorial Park in Fullerton.






SVR Color Guard Marches in 52nd Annual Torrance Armed Forces Day Parade

A combined SVR color guard of Company G, 5th California Infantry and Marine Corps Guard Company – Mare Island marched in the 52nd Annual Armed Forces Day Parade in Torrance on Saturday, May 21, 2011.

The Torrance parade is the longest consecutive running Armed Forces Day Parade in the nation. This was the tenth time an SVR color guard has participated in the parade since the year 2000. The 2010 parade was missed



because the troops were serving as an honor guard at a grave marker dedication on the same day as the parade. Members of the color guard represented Camps 2, 17, and 18 of southern California.

Color Guard participants for the Marine Guard Company were Orderly Sergeant Rudy Velasco III-PCC (Camp 18), Sergeant Glen Roosevelt-DC (Camp 17), and Corporal Ken Walker (Camp 2/18). Marching for Company G, 5th California Infantry were Privates Gerald "Shiloh" Scheib (Camp 2), Bill LaConte (Camp 2), and Rudy Velasco IV-JVC (Camp 18). Yolie Scheib of the Rosecrans Auxiliary No. 2 joined the color guard as an escort and number carrier. The color guard has the distinction of being the closing guard of the parade, marching just ahead of the final band from Torrance High School.

The parade stepped off at 1:30 PM, and followed the mile-and-a-half route west on Torrance Boulevard straight into the headwind of the afternoon onshore sea breeze. The robust wind straightened the flags due east, and made the march a challenge to keep up a pace headed west. The parade ended at the Torrance Civic Center just after passing the reviewing stand that was filled with civic leaders and military officers.

Rookie Marcher Walks Away with Fund-Raiser Pistol

After the parade the weary marchers met at the Red Car Brew Pub in Old Town Torrance to celebrate surviving the event. During the respite the Camp 18 members were presented with this year's official City participation award for their Camp's first-time involvement in the parade. Retired Navy Reservist Gerald Scheib presented the Marine Guard members with a special bottle of *Jarhead Red* wine as a reward for their service.

The *coup-de-grace* of the day was carried off by rookie parade marcher Rudy Velasco IV of Camp 18. The winning contributor of the 2012 National Encampment fund-raiser Model 1858 Remington Pistol was drawn out of a Hardee hat full of contribution ticket stubs by Auxiliary member Yolie Scheib. Amazingly the winning stub was from Rudy Velasco IV, who was making a video of the drawing selection while his name was being drawn from the hat. The Remington Pistol fund-raiser that started at the March 2011 Department Encampment, and continued to accept contributions through the end of April, garnered \$750 towards the 2012 National Encampment fund.

Call to order by Sr. Vice-Commander Charles Beal.

SVC Beal read Department Order No. 2 on the death of Department Memorials Officer Kirby Morgan.

Minutes of meeting of 3-17-11 were submitted, moved to approve by Walter Davis, seconded by Joe Hart, and approved by membership.

Treasurer Report – by Terry Shaw: balance at 4/30/2011 was \$3,443.24, income for March/April was \$330.00 and expenses totaled \$343.76 for a net loss of \$13.76. The start-up donation to Camp 18 for \$300.00 was issued in March. Also, annual dues of \$1,081.00 were paid to the Dept. (includes National) in May. It was noted the annual IRS form 990N was filed on time. The report was moved to approve by Walter Davis, seconded by Joe Hart, subject to audit. Approved by membership.

Report on health of Brothers: Ed Ord was reported as being terminally ill, Jim Blauer was reported ill and recovering, and "Doc" Lutes was present and gladly reported as recovered. Our prayers are with our Brothers and families in distress.

Glen Roosevelt reported that the application of Kyle Ryan that was received in January (but dated October 2010) was returned to Kyle's parents for resubmittal if they wished. We had tried to contact the parents to explain the long delay, but were unable to find a phone number, or to get any response by e-mail.

Committees: Glen Roosevelt reported on progress of the Bob Hope Patriotic Hall renovation, and on the planning for the 2012 Los Angeles National Encampment.

New business:

Charles Beal introduced four items for discussion for approval of payment of funds:

- 1) Donation of \$50.00 to Tri City Memorial Day Committee for May 30, 2011 Memorial Day services; motion by Walter Davis to approve, second by Bob Drennan, passed.

Always In The Middle Of The Battle: Edward Kiniry And The 1st Illinois Light Artillery Battery D (Hardcover)


Edward Kiniry, a young Illinois private, served in Battery D, 1st Illinois Light Artillery, from 1861-1864. His letters, as well as a unit history of the battery, are smoothly mixed with the comments of the soldier's grandson and the author of this book. Mr. Wall visited many of the sites where his grandfather fought in the Western Theater, and wrote of the intensity of his feelings when standing on the very ground where the battery had been positioned. In addition, his research was thorough and well documented.

Edward's descriptions of the marches, battles, heat, cold, thirst, and hard work come to life on these pages. His encounter with General Ulysses S. Grant is simple and amusing, although it probably wasn't funny at the time.

For a close-up view of life in the artillery during some of the hottest battles of the war, this book is a fine read.

Mr. Wall has been a sailor in the U.S. Navy, worked as an aircraft assembler, a draftsman, and then as an electromechanical designer. He also was a manager for two electronics firms. He then founded a successful design firm and cofounded another. Travel to Nigeria, Israel, and Puerto Rico for business was involved. When he was in Africa, a military coup kept him from communicating with his family for seven days as he attempted to find safety further in the jungle, crossing and recrossing the Niger River. He has also visited many countries for pleasure. For the last five years his travel has been to American Civil War sites, some of which was research for his book.


David was also involved in building and racing two dragsters. He has attended Miramar College and the University of California at San Diego.
