While recently visiting his home town in Ohio and doing a little bit of research he found that his Great-Great Grandfather William M. Morris and his brother, G-G-Grand Uncle Francis Morris both served in the Civil War.

1st Sgt. Francis Morris was killed in action while serving with the 33rd Ohio Infantry Regiment at the battle of Perryville, Kentucky on 8 October 1862. He is buried at the Camp Nelson National Cemetery.

Brother Morris' G-G-Grandfather William Morris served in Co. D, 194th Ohio Volunteer Infantry Regiment, which was mustered into service for the Civil War in March 1865 and mustered out in October 1865.

REPORT

Memorial Day Service at Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery

On Saturday, 27 May, Camp 18 held their 8th annual Memorial Service at Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery in Riverside. Our first service at this cemetery was held on 30 May 2010 when the Camp was known as Division #7, before we received our SUVCW Charter.

There were a few other groups involved in helping the Camp make this year's Memorial service a success, such as Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery Board Members and Docents, Rosecrans Auxiliary #2 - Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil, Amamda Stokes Tent #87 of the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War and of course, the Brothers of General Stoneman Camp 18 and their families.

The audience for this years' ceremony was on the small side, about 30, despite the advertising in the local "Press-Enterprise" newspaper, the poster board attached to the cemetery gate and on our Camp's and Cemetery's websites.

The service opened with greetings from Commander Doyle and the Pledge of Allegiance. Commander Doyle also led the group in singing the National Anthem, which actually sounded pretty good.

Camp Senior Vice Commander Richard Burns continued the service with a reading of General Logan's General Order #11 which reminds us why and directs us to decorate the graves of our Civil War and all American veterans. If you have not read "General Order #11, please look it up on Internet. It is a very eloquent and poignant decree.

Commander Doyle carried on with the main theme of the ceremony, "The California Column, the Forgotten Civil War Soldiers."

The Commander described some of the hardships of the Civil War soldiers in the far, far western theatre, for example, the 900 mile march that the California Column made from Los Angeles through Arizona to El Paso, Texas and the skirmishes encountered with Confederate troops. Although these skirmishes were nowhere close to the size and scale of the eastern battles, they were still civil war soldiers willing to give all to preserve the Union.

Rosecrans Auxiliary No. 2 Sister Susan Sweet continued the program by reading "The Unknown Dead" poem written by Elizabeth Robbin Berry, Patriotic Instructor to the Women's Relief Corps 1909.

The wreath presentations began with Auxiliary Sisters Susan Sweet and Melinie Prost-Caines placing a wreath at the Women's Relief Corps monument in the Grand Army of the Republic circle of graves.

Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery Board members Nancy Cox and Judith Auth started the wreath placements to the military service branch flags and were escorted to the flags by Camp 18's uniformed musket detail.

Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War – Amanda Stokes Tent No. 87 President Cindy Allen also placed a wreath at the military service branch flags along

with Auxiliary Sisters Susan Sweet and Melinie Caines.

The final wreath presentation of the day was delivered by Jr Member Bodie Crowder and mom Jennifer.

The ceremony moved towards closing with Chaplain Bill Daley giving the Closing Prayer followed by a musket salute from Camp 18 musket team of Michael Bullard, Rudolph Velasco IV and Rudy Velasco III.
