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Memorial Day Service 2023

We could not have asked for a more pleasant day to spend a few hours outside honoring the memory of our Civil War/Grand Army of the Republic ancestors.

We had an audience of about 50 including family and friends attending.

Let's start at the beginning,... On Friday, May 26th, Camp 18 Brothers Mike Emett and John Morris met up at Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery in Riverside to place flags on the Civil War and Spanish/American War veteran's graves at the G.A.R Circle to get the area ready for the Camp's Memorial Day Ceremony on Saturday May 27th. The guys made sure that all veteran's graves had flags in the immediate area, for the Memorial Day weekend.

On Saturday morning, hours before the Camp ceremony was to begin, Brothers gathered to start setting up for the proceedings. Brother John Morris directed a large group of volunteers that arrived to place flags on the veteran's graves throughout the rest of the cemetery. On Line Civil War Event by Camp JVC Steve Matthews

On April 14th, I attended a Civil War Symposium via zoom which was held at the National Museum of the United States Army, In Fort Belvoir, Virginia. I appreciate brother Rudy for connecting me to this event -Steve Matthews

This full day event was called "A new birth of Freedom, Abraham Lincoln and the Civil War"

A significant amount of time was spent in examining the various campaigns by both Union and Confederate armies in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. In many ways this area and various other battles was a microcosm of the war as a whole. Geographically this could have been a launch point for the South to attack Washington DC. In fact the Confederates came up to, but did not cross the Potomac at Washington, D.C. This 1862 thrust toward Washington by Confederate General Jackson understandably worried President Lincoln.

Which army controlled the Shenandoah was a constant theme during the whole Civil War.

Most of the speakers made clear the connections between victories and losses on the battlefield to decisions that President Lincoln had to make on the political front.

Lincoln constantly searched for a General who could lead the overall Union Army, and one who would fight.

In 1863 after Grant led the strategic victory in the "West" at Vicksburg, (the West then was seen as the Mississippi River), President Lincoln named him to lead the overall Union Army and in particular engage Lee and his Army of Northern Virginia in Virginia!

Surprisingly Grant left most of the top military officers in the Union Army in place when he assumed overall command.

Grant did move General Sheridan and his Calvary troops to the Shenandoah which was key to putting the Confederates on the defensive.

Interesting reasons that some Generals stayed in place even if not effective for the Union Army. One such case was General Siegal who was of German heritage. One of the key ethnic groups that supported President Lincoln and the Union were the Germans. Sacking Siegal from command could have alienated German Americans from supporting Lincoln.

Up to Grant's assuming control of the Union Army, President Lincoln was intricately involved in planning of battles. Some might say he micro managed events. This was no longer the case when Grant was in command.

It was not certain that President Lincoln would be re-elected in 1864. The War went badly for the Union in 1862 and not until the Union victory at Vicksburg in 1863 by General Sherman and then Grant beginning to turn the tide in Virginia did Lincoln win re-election. One speaker said the turn of events in Virginia was decisive to determine the vote in the presidential

election of 1864. I believe all 3 of these events were necessary.

In referencing the lack of willingness to fight, General George McClelland was at the top of the list. How much his eventual decision to run for President vs Lincoln played into this behavior is a subject for some debate. Eventually things came to a head when events led to huge changes in the focus of the war.

As Union lines moved, slaves came with them. This forced the issue and Lincoln had to determine what to do about the question of slavery. The nature of the war changed over time with Secretary of Defense Stanton pushing that to win the war, it had to be waged against the southern population. General McClelland opposed this approach. In a letter to President Lincoln he mirrored the same Pro Slavery, Pro Southern approach of the Southern Democratic Party of those times and advocated taking a soft hand to southern civilians.

President Lincoln realized that the North could not win with this approach and had to address slavery. He planned the historic Emancipation Proclamation freeing the slaves in Confederate States. But Lincoln waited until the Battle of Antietam, a Union Victory and Confederates being driven from Maryland before signing the Emancipation Proclamation freeing millions of slaves.

General McClelland, in a particularly disloyal approach, told Union troops if you don't like the freeing of the slaves then vote Lincoln out of office.

There was considerable effort on the part of the Confederacy to involve England and France on their side of the Civil War.

Both countries had already abolished slavery. Once the US Civil War was defined about slavery per the issuing of the Emancipation Proclamation by President Lincoln, did the support of these foreign countries melt away from the Confederacy.

The great bulk of the presentations during this full day were intricate discussions of battles, battle plans, misjudgments, and opportunities taken which determined the outcome of those battles and ultimately the Civil War.

Throw Back Event, it happened 122 years ago A 1901 event of the SoV-GAR-USWV, 4th of July Picnic (USWV-United Spanish War Veterans) June 22, 1901

The time for talking celebration – that is a regular, ragtime Corona celebration for the Fourth, has passed; so those who are bent on observing the great national holiday, celebration or no celebration, are beginning to

cast about for suggestions and formulate plans. But Custer Camp, No. 18, Sons of Veterans, has already settled the matter for a goodly portion of the community.

With the aid of Carlton Post, G.A.R. and the resident Spanish-American war volunteers it will undertake to organize a mammoth picnic party to spend the day at Coldwater or some other favorable mountain fastness, where, provided with sundry and divers baskets, buckets and bottles and other picknicking requisites, the participants will revel in the lap of Nature whilst they comfort the inner being with the luxuries of the marts of civilization.

It is also possible that an appropriate literary and musical program will be provided in order to show proper respect to the cherished traditions of the day. Reading of the Declaration of Independence, a short address, recitations, singing and music by the City Band are talked of as probable features of such a program.

Plans for this picnic excursion are well under way and the promotors will spare no effort to make it a success. If the services of the band are secured, a refreshment stand will run on the grounds to bely defray the expense.
