
Dues are \$50.00 for a single adult, one year membership.

This event commemorated the 160th anniversary of three important historic events:

The event was attended by about 300 people. They were treated to historic reenactments by a President Lincoln and Frederic Douglass reenactors. They both gave inspirational performances.

Massachusetts Secretary of Education Patrick Tutwiler spoke of the need to teach the truth about history.

"We need to celebrate this history and the freedoms won in these three historic events" he said.

We were welcomed by the Mayor of Lynn, MA. and other speakers who addressed present day issues like voter rights, and the freedom to read.

Steve Matthews, our Junior Vice Commander was one of 3 individuals who organized this event. Steve is originally from Lynn MA.

This event was organized by The GAR museum and the Lynn Museum/Lynn Arts. It was sponsored by the local newspaper there, the Daily Item. Among others who endorsed this event were the ECCO (60 faith based organizations) and the Lynn Teachers Union. Steve's family was well represented there with about 30 family members.

Earlier that day, a commemoration was held at the Pine Grove Cemetery, at the Civil War circle where over 700 of our brave Union soldiers are buried. The Local SUVCW jointly organized this event along with Steve Matthews and 6 members of the historic MA 54th, so called "Colored Troops "also participated.

Also that day, the City of Lynn conducted a tour of some of the 140 plus Abolitionist graves also at Pine Grove Cemetery. It was a full day of honoring our ancestors who fought to keep our country free.

Eagle Scout Report

Happy to announce that the Camp had an Eagle Scout Certificate request this season. Thank you, Brother Department Eagle Scout Coordinator Hawk, for forwarding the request.

In September, the Camp mailed an Eagle Scout Commendation Certificate to Eagle Scout Matthew DeWitt, for a presentation at the October 28 Eagle Court of Honor. Matthew's Eagle Scout project was coordinating the rebuilding of the middle grade quad at Temecula Middle School.

"Damn the torpedoes, Full speed ahead!" was a statement made famous by Union Admiral David G. Farragut in Mobile Bay, August 1864.

Early assemblyman was an advocate of Riverside County

Andrew S. Milice earned his place in the history of Riverside County as an early assemblyman, representing the Riverside area. He served in the 1899 and 1901 sessions.

Milice was born in Indiana in 1938. He was always referred to as "Captain Milice" because of his service in the Union Army during the Civil War. Milice was severely wounded by a shot in the shoulder at the battle of Chickamauga. In the field hospital he contracted hepatitis and typhoid fever and was sent home to die. Miraculously, he did not, although his shoulder was never the same.

In 1881 Captain Milice and family left Indiana for California and settled in the Los Angeles area. In 1891 he bought a 10-acre orange grove in Riverside. In 1896 the family permanently moved to Riverside and by 1898 the Captain was in the banking and insurance business. In 1899 he was nominated for state assembly on the Republican ticket. He won and served in the 1899 session, representing the 33rd district. During that session, Milice worked on prison reform and introduced a bill to get Riverside County State buildings inside the county's borders.

Milice was very active in the Grand Army of the Republic chapter in Riverside. In 1916 he was the Grand Marshal for the Riverside Memorial Day observances in honor of his Civil War service.

Milice died in September 1919, two days after the 56th anniversary of his wounding in the Battle of Chickamauga. He was buried in Evergreen Cemetery. His wife Emma died in 1921 and she was buried next to her husband.

The Riverside Daily Press called him one of Riverside's "honored pioneer citizens" and said he had "literally hundreds of friends."

The Rush to Arms A Surge of Patriotism

On April 15, 1861, English journalist William H. Russell was passing through Goldsboro, N.C., when word arrived that the Union garrison in Fort Sumter at Charleston Harbor, S.C., had surrendered. An impromptu celebration engulfed the town, reported Russell, with flushed faces, wild eyes, screaming mouths hurrahing for "Jeff Davis" and "the Southern Confederacy," so that the yells overpowered the discordant bands which were busy with "Dixie's Land."

The roar of cannon at Charleston was the signal for men throughout the country to flock to recruiting stations and sign up either to fight for Southern independence or to put down the rebellion. Mass rallies, complete with patriotic speeches and music were held to issue appeals to loyal citizens to rush to arms. A Detroit newspaper reported: "The Star-Spangled Banner rages most furiously. The old inspiring national anthem is played by the bands, whistled by the juveniles, sung in the theater. The banner itself floats proudly and beautifully in every direction." Men and boys, carried away by the exuberance left their homes and families in huge numbers. A Southerner reported that his company of recruits was "young, ardent and full of enthusiasm" while marching off to war "with as little thought of the coming trouble, as if on the way to some festive entertainment."

In the North, President Abraham Lincoln had issued a call for 75,000 volunteers to put down the rebellion. In a very short time, every Northern state had exceeded its quota of regiments. Indiana Gov. Oliver P. Morton boasted that his state alone could immediately provide 300,000 men. In the South, Gov. John J. Pettus wrote to Confederate President Jefferson Davis that "All Mississippi is in a fever to get to the field, and hail an order to march as the greatest favor you can confer upon that both them." many men volunteered governments, unable to arm and equip all of the volunteers, had to send many regiments back home. When the surge of patriotism died away, those men would be much harder to get into the ranks.

Fascinating Fact: The Confederacy announced a policy that the government would arm and equip only regiments that had signed up for three years. Twelvemonth units would have to supply their own equipment.
