Congratulations to Evergreen Cemetery

Our local Evergreen cemetery in Riverside, where many of our Civil War Veteran forefathers and GAR members are interred, has recently been added to the National Register of Historic Cemeteries. The cemetery opened in the late 1890's.

Both Boards of the cemetery will be celebrating the recent addition to the National Registry with a small gathering on Saturday, 16 November.

The Camp's proposed headstone cleaning event has been postponed as to not interfere with the cemetery's celebration.

Historic Year for the Emett Boys a report for Camp 18 Officer Mike Emett

This has been an incredible year for SUVCW Camp 18 members Mike and Mike Emett. Chief Master Sergeant Mike Emett (photo right) was present when Doctor Mike Emett (son) received his PHD in history from the University of South Carolina, Columbia early this year.



While in town for the festivities, Mike and Mike traveled to Fort Sumter where the younger (doctor) Mike works as a Volunteer Docent.

Chief Mike spent the entire day at the fort, usually a one-hour tour, but the NPS supervisor allowed him to stay until the final boat left along with his son.

During this interlude, Chief Mike was able to gather the names of all soldiers along with one civilian woman, a matron, who were present for the bombardment of April 1861. Later, after returning home, Chief Mike did biographical research on all of the individuals at the fort during April 1861, submitting a 64-page summary of what he found to the staff at Fort Sumter.

Much of the information was unknown at the time. He also registered 20 names to the SUVCW data base as a part of his duties as Camp 18 Graves registration Officer

Professor Mike received his PHD with his entire family as well as his parents in attendance. The following day, both Mikes were invited to a formal book signing ceremony near Beaufort, South Carolina. Doctor Edda L. Fields-Black, a professor at Andrew Mellon University in Pennsylvania cited both Mikes for their contributions to her research on Harriet Tubman and the Combahee River Raid. Her recent literary effort, **COMBEE**, masterly details the struggles of Harriet and all those slaves, along with Freedmen, who endeavored. Doctor Fields-Black had gleaned information from Mike's (the younger) Master's Thesis on Port Royal and asked for his resources. He referenced her to Chief Mike, owner of the Severance Family papers, who offered her access to the original documents. She spent a week in Billings, Montana, pouring over the diaries and letters, finding information that she needed to successfully make conclusions in her Tubman story.

Recently, Professor Mike has been hired to teach history at the University of Alabama, Huntsville. At this time, he was also asked to present at a history/philosophy conference at Austin Peay University in Clarksville, Tennessee. Both Mikes attended the conference, Professor Mike discussing a portion of his dissertation on Fort Sumter, "Silencing Unionists and the Archives: Charleston, SC and the Murder of Frederick Potter during the Civil War."

They both attended other presentations, one of which was titled, "The Ethics of War: Torpedoes in the American Civil War."

With the free time, the Emett men visited Fort Donelson, Fort Defiance, the Battle of Stones River, the battle of Nashville and the Battle of Franklin. At all times, Chief Emett hunted out cemeteries looking for out honored dead.

After Stones Mountain, he discovered an all-Negro cemetery with the remains of 20 African-American Soldiers. Other spots were visited as well, Fort Campbell and the Hermitage.

All in all, this has been a historic year for the Emett boys!

President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation to observe the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving in 1863. President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in November 1963.

The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature that they cannot fail to penetrate and

even soften the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God.

In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign states to invite and provoke their aggressions, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere, except in the theater of military conflict; while that theater has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense have not arrested the plow, the shuttle, or the ship; the ax has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege, and the battlefield, and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised, nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people. I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a Day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the

heavens. And I recommend to them that, while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United Stated States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-eighth.
