It was with sadness that I was given the job of reporting to many of you by phone the passing of Bob Lowe recently. I apologize to those I was not able to contact in this manner but as time was limited, I decided to inform the remainder by e-mail. Impersonal as it may

be, I felt time dictated it be done that way. If you are just hearing about Bob now, please be informed that I have a few email addresses that are not active or correct so, please update me if you didn't hear from me. Bob was the second SUVCW Brother I met (after Gene Armistead who recruited me), and I was always very impressed with his gentle nature, and his ways of making people feel welcomed. I felt I was immediately a member of our group, and that I was valuable to the group because of him. My wife, Sandy, put it best when commenting on him after the National Encampment last summer. She simply said, "What a gentleman"!! I couldn't agree more. In short, he was the BEST! Bob's memorial service was held at the El Cajon Elks Lodge on July 2. I am

happy to inform all that although the service was an Elks function, it was well attended by SUVCW members from all over the State of California, with a good representation of the Brothers and Ladies of Camp 21. As everyone knows, Bob was a pillar in our Order and especially for Camp 21. One could almost expect him to be

present at any SUVCW function that took place. It seems that many members of the Camp had it in the backs of their minds that they didn't necessarily need to attend functions because "Bob and Rosemary will be there." Eulogy for Bob Lowe by DC Jerry Sayre

The Elks Memorial Service is one of long tradition and provided strictly for its members. The Lowe family and I deeply appreciate the permission and cooperation extended to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War by the Exalted Ruler and Officers of this Lodge by allowing us to be a part of this celebration of Bob's life. Our sincere gratitude is extended to all involved. I stand here today to officially say good bye to my dear friend Bob Lowe. He didn't care much for the name Robert. All knew him as "Bob" with one "O" as he used to say. Such was the quiet humor that defined Bob. Bob Lowe was a quiet, perhaps overly modest man, acutely conscious of his responsibilities and prone to deprecate his own charms and abilities. This loved and loving husband and father was also my best friend and colleague over the past 12 years. Our friendship took us to six National Encampments, from Missouri to New Hampshire. We stood together placing flags on the Graves in the National Cemetery at Gettysburg in 26 degree weather. We marched in 100's of parades and stood together atop "Little Round Top" and looked over the field where "Pickett's Charge" took place. Despite his proclivity to understate his contributions and never seeking acknowledgment, Bob was named this Lodge's "Citizen of the Year" in 2000, and ELK of the Year for 2001, an award in which he was duly proud. Bob chaired and served on several Veterans and Americanism Committees. In yet another organization, The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Bob was our most active member. He was Past Camp Commander of the Sqt. Wm. Pittenger Camp 21, where he was named "Brother of the Year" 2006. He was also Past Department Commander of the Department of California and Pacific. He was National Graves Registration Officer for many years, helping to modernize the volumes of data onto a workable and searchable database that, with his guidance, became accessible online. This meant inputting and processing data for 100s of 1000s of Civil War Veterans. Bob was nominated for the Cornelius F. Whitehouse Outstanding Brother of the Year Award. Many Were present when our Commander in Chief awarded Bob with our Highest National Honor in 2005. It was Bob who must have recognized something in me early in our association, and he mentored me on my path in the "Sons." All that I have accomplished is due directly to his influence. I looked up to his example in



The Critical 1864 Election by Tom Helmantoler




Abraham Lincoln, 16th President as he appeared in his first term

If 1860 was the most pivotal election in US History, 1864 was the most unique election, and quite possibly, the most important. Abraham Lincoln participated in both of them and was by no means a heavy favorite in either of them. With 2008 also being an election year, there are

similarities between the two elections, this year and 1864. The country is at war now but in 1864, the

country was at war with itself. In 2008, we have a former military man opposed by a person with no military experience, as back then (Lincoln had very little). In both years, a sizeable segment of the population wanted the war ended. But, of course, differences existed, too. In 1864, eleven of the states weren't even going to participate in any meaningful way. But Dramatic painting of the era the election was critical, in



that Lincoln's opponent, his old nemesis, popular Gen. George McClellan, had all but promised to get the war ended, no matter what it took. Lincoln promised more fighting, and more death. 1864 was a very bloody year in the Civil War. Such circumstances never make a President popular. But, the

major difference between the two men was that McClellan was a military man and Lincoln was a wily



politician. Clellan knew that keeping his men safe made him popular with his Lincoln men. used another one of his many political skills. Lincoln had the uncanny personal ability of keeping his ego under control until it was time to use his power to his advantage. Lincoln endured

many personal affronts from some of his Cabinet members (most notably Salmon P. Chase, his Treasury Secretary who lusted to be President) and especially Gen. McClellan, when he was Commanding General of the Army of the Potomac. McClellan was immensely popular with his men, and, he thought, with the entire Union Army. McClellan thought he would be able to ride that popularity into office. Lincoln had other ideas, mainly to circumvent Mc-

Clellan. Lincoln made many celebrated trips into the field to visit the Union troops, at times endangering himself. He not only would come to review the troops and meet with his

generals, he would visit with the men as individuals. He also would visit wounded men in the many hospitals in the Washington area, especially at the Soldier's Home, where he liked to stay to escape the stifling city heat in summertime, as well as to get away from the hectic atmosphere of the Executive Mansion. These simple visits were to pay off handsomely in the general election. So were the passes given to Union troops to go home to vote. Lincoln's personal touch so impressed the Union Army that when the election came, the troops decided to vote for Lincoln by a huge majority. The troops gave a hard look at several things. Which candidate gave them the best chance of winning the war? Which candidate was standing with them to victory after all the death and destruction they had seen? And which

candidate had given the personal contact that showed who really cared about them? Many of the soldiers that voted for McClellan did so out of old loyalty to him, or because of the dislike of the war in general, a kind of protest vote against Lincoln. more than a vote for McClellan. coln's victory in the 1864 election, which as late as September he privately said he ex-

pected to lose, was no landslide. His margin of voter approval, while not great, seemed to have been boosted by the large majority the Union Army votes for him. It's just another reason for SUVCW members to be proud of the "Boys in Blue." Back then, a tall person was referred to as "long." With that in mind, Lincoln announced soon after his election victory, "Long Abe a little longer!!" It's too bad for the country that it wasn't to be a lot longer. We can only wonder how Reconstruction might have gone had he lived to see it through.

both word and action, and tried to do things the way I had seen Bob do them before me. The word I like to use to describe Bob is "Class." Webster defines Class as "Excellence or Quality in style, appearance or behavior. A Cut Above." Bob exhibited more of it than anyone else I know. It is also defined as "A place of Learning." This, too, describes Bob. He was boundless with the generosity of his knowledge. Whether it was the countless students he taught in their classrooms, along with Rosemary, regarding history and the Civil War, or the 1000s of people we came in contact with at numerous events around the country, Bob taught us all. Three years ago, I was in this very room to hear Bob deliver his comforting words for our mutual friend Al Hodges, not then, envisioning this day would come. Bob and I often joked that "The key to originality is not revealing where you borrowed your best stuff." From his eulogy for Al, I found these words that truly speak of Bob himself. Here was a man of superlatively high standards, complete integrity and boundless enthusiasm for whatever task he took in hand. No one, whose privilege it was to know him, is likely to forget the candor of his speech, or the warm and glowing brightness of his friendship. He never dodged a responsibility, never refused to take on a hard job if it needed to be done. What he preached, he practiced. What he believed, he believed with heart and soul. He fought hard for every cause in which he enlisted, and causes for which he fought were good and right. His devotion to Veterans, Americanism and Patriotism was unmatched. To Rosemary, Bob's family and many friends, I say that no one can better appreciate than I, who am utterly brokenhearted by the loss of my beloved friend, what your suffering must be and I pray that you may be supported by Him to Whom alone the sorely stricken can look for comfort in this hour of heavy affliction. In closing, I should like to quote the words of the great Abraham Lincoln, who, in his memorable Gettysburg Address said, "The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here." In this instance, Bob Lowe, an honored, respected and revered member of our organizations, gave of himself unstintingly to the preservation of American History and the Honoring of Veterans of this Great Country, and he gave more of himself than probably he knew to those of us who needed sound, experienced and wise counsel or assistance. Bob Lowe was loved by many, his contributions boundless and he leaves a huge, un-fillable void in our lives. Those who knew him were made better people merely by association. Bob will be sorely missed and always remembered. Goodbye, my friend.

Editor's note: Dept Cmdr Jerry Sayre's eulogy is printed with his permission & grateful thanks from the Pittenger Camp. Fine words for the Finest Brother our Camp has yet been blessed to know. May God help us to walk in Bob's footsteps as we seek to remember the "Boys in Blue."
