

Lincoln: A Paradox? by Tom Helmantoler

President Lincoln was - if anything - a paradox of a man. For a person who most prominent historians today regard as the best of our Presidents, he was a hard person to figure out, and to predict.

This can be seen in several ways. First, his physical appearance wouldn't fit today's view of being, "Presidential." His overly tall, gangly physical build caused his clothes, which were, "store bought," to be usually ill fitting. His coat sleeves were usually too short, and often his pants were as well. His feet were large; his hair was very coarse. His long face and sad-appearing eyes would not inspire confidence today. Even his voice, which had a high pitch to it, was different. He was tall, ("long," was the word used in the 1860's)

about 6'4," which was very tall for his time, but weighed only about 185 lbs. when he became President. In addition, he had lost about 20 lbs. by 1865. He often wore his battered "stove pipe hat,"

which was easy to recognize and made him appear taller. He didn't cut an impressive physical appearance. As Commander in Chief of the military during possibly the most serious threat to

the survival of the USA in our history, he had very little military experience to call upon in which to accomplish this. He served a very brief time in the Illinois militia, during the Black Hawk War of the 1830's and even though he was elected commander of his unit, he didn't have much interest in the military. But he learned pretty quickly. He went through a series of poor generals, until he found better ones. He fired one of his Cabinet members (Simon Cameron) for war profiteering

and corruption. Even though he could be quite tough on "Copperhead" politicians, (see Rep. Clement Vallandingham) he usually commuted

The meeting was called to order by Commander Tom Helmantoler at 3:35pm at the Restoration Warehouse of the Flying Leatherneck Aviation Museum, MCAS Miramar, San Diego, California. The opening prayer was offered W. Tisch and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by M. Schooling.

I. Honored Attendees

II. Program

III. Presentations

V. Bob Lowe Remembrance

J. Sayre reported the importance of the work Bob Lowe has done at the National level of the SUVCW and the positive impression he has made over many years with Brothers throughout the nation. He distributed a picture of the "Story of the Vacant Chair" that was displayed at the National Encampment. J. May suggested that a proper way be found to memorialize the work of Br. Lowe. Suggestions include 1) a memorial bench on G.A.R. Hill at Mt. Hope Cemetery, 2) an annual grant given in Br. Lowe's name to a camp or department for a worthy project, 3) Camp involvement in the Graves Registration Effort, 4) naming the Eagle Scout presentation in his honor, 5) naming the Speech Contest in his honor, or 6) creating a "Fraternity, Charity, Loyalty" Award named after him.

VI. Report from National Encampment

J. Sayre reported that the National Encampment awarded the Dept. of Calif. and Pacific the gold

"Lincoln Fellowship" streamer for the \$1250 the dept. contributed to the National Charitable Foundation Abraham Lincoln Endowment Fund in honor of Br. Bob Lowe. The newly elected National Patriotic Instructor is Jerry Sayre and he will be emphasizing the history and significance behind some of the ritual that our ancestors in the G.A.R. and SUVCW observed. David V. Medert has been elected Commander-In-Chief and the Dept. of Calif. and Pacific is making a bid to host the 2012 National Encampment.

VII. Minutes of Last Meeting

A motion (Sayre/Allyn) to approve the minutes of the last meeting, as published in <u>The General</u>, passed.

VIII. Officers' Reports

- 2) Sec. J. May reported correspondence from a) the Civil War Preservation Trust, b) the 2nd VT Battery, soliciting donations to help their organization recover from a legal battle, and c) Dept. of New Hampshire Cmdr. Dan Meehan sending condolences to the Camp for the loss of Br. Bob Lowe.
- 4) Treas. J. May reported that since the last meeting, the Camp had expenses of \$177.04 and income of \$123.00. The balance is \$3379.01, of which
- \$1325.45 is in the Flagpole Replacement Fund and \$40.00 is in the Minter's Ranch Fund.

IX. Committee Reports

- T. Helmantoler reported for Br. Gene Arimistead that no further progress on the Minter's Ranch project has occurred.
- The Last Soldier Project will be headed by J. Malone. He will get current information from J. May.
- 3) J. May reported that the Lincoln 200th Birthday Committee would like the Camp to sponsor a parade and our first annual speech contest. The La Jolla Symphony Orchestra was approached and they have agreed to schedule Copland's "Lincoln Portrait" in their February, 2009 concert. Br. W. Peck will not be available, but W. Tisch is still working with VMMC Board of Directors to plan the parade. W. Tisch is awaiting approval of a flyer to distribute to appropriate organizations in San Diego County.
- 4) Jan Shaffer has completed her "Lincoln Bicentennial" quilt. It is currently in possession of Brenda Poole.

the death penalty on convicted deserters to prison time. He had so little ego about himself that he told Gen. Grant, "When you are in the field,

ARE the vou Union." He neither wanted. nor sought, credit for accomplishments during the War. As a politician, his name first became known during his first term in the House when he manded that he be shown the, "damn spot," where. "American blood

has been shed on American soil," as Gen. Zachary Taylor put it during the 1846 debate to determine the Declaration of War on Mexico. He also made the decision to reinforce Fort Sumter in 1861 AND told Gov. Francis Pickens of South Carolina




that he was going to do just that. He didn't inform Confederate Pres. Iefferson Davis because it would have amounted to a tacit recognition of the CSA. This all but insured that Civil War the would happen. Even his personal life was a paradox. Although a reasonably successful attorney, he was from a poverty-

stricken background. His wife came from a wellto-do family from Kentucky, and insisted on the finest of everything. This led to his family being in serious debt when he died. He exercised virtually no disciplinary control over his own (mainly,


Willie and Tad) chil-They often dren. went with him to his office on Sunday mornings while his wife was in church and they made a shambles of his office, much to the chagrin of his law partners. After Tad lost his brother to illness in 1862, his father was his playmate, as much as he could be.

Elder son, Robert, who served in the Army during the War



Tad routinely interrupted Cabinet meetings, which were enough of challenge to Lincoln, as it was. Or maybe his biggest paradox wasn't a para-

dox. He loved his kids and his wife, even with their faults. He loved all his soldiers, even the deserters. He didn't care what his enemies' politicians thought. And, he didn't care what his clothes looked like. What do you think today's media would have done to



him? Could he have been elected today? Do you think he would have cared? History, as always, is what historians say it is. That's why we read it, and rewrite it.

NOTE! Important New Miramar Entry Instructions!

Our hosts. Steve Smith & Deanne Shearn write:

"If you do not have a DOD ID and/or a DOD sticker on your car, please allow 10 extra minutes and follow the new procedures to enter MCAS Miramar.

Exit **MIRAMAR WAY** off Hwy 15 and enter MCAS Miramar through the East gate. Tell the sentry you need a "day pass" and be sure the driver has his ID, vehicle registration, and proof of insurance. If they ask what your business is on the base, simply tell the sentry that you have a meeting with Steve Smith, Curator of the Flying Leatherneck Aviation Museum at the restoration warehouse. If anyone has any problems, questions, concerns, they may call Steve on his cell 619.889.9372.

Once on the base, drive West on Miramar Way and turn RIGHT at the 2nd stop light, onto Mitscher. Drive through the 1st light (at McDonalds corner) to the 4-way STOP sign. Turn LEFT at the stop sign onto DELTA. The warehouse is the 2nd building on the left. Look for the USA flag!

If you have DOD ID and/or DOD sticker on your car, please continue to use the North gate off Miramar Road, turn RIGHT onto Delta and go from there."
