"For The People" by Esmat Elhalaby, of Patrick Henry High School 2009 Pittenger Prize Orator

November 19th, 1863 the man whose birth we celebrate today gave a speech in dedication of a battle, one that killed thousands of Americans who were fighting for the maintenance of the Republic. That day at Gettysburg,

President Lincoln reminded all of us why we must fight to uphold our republic; in his final tricolon he exclaimed that government of, by and for the people, shall not perish from this earth. Lincoln chose "for the people" to end his famous phrase, for it is that that is most important in our nation's experiment with democracy. The Civil War was the greatest test of our nation's ability; it came less than one hundred years after the inception of our republic, with it came a rebirth of the revolu-

tionary zeal that the founders held dear. A zeal that proclaimed that it is "we the people in order to form a more perfect union," and "we (who) hold these truths to

be self-evident." A zeal that has maintained a nation – one that constantly reminds us of the importance of unity, of respect. Today our nation once again is facing hardships - hardships that are the product of greed seep-

ing into the pores of the highest leaders of industry and the most senior members of politics, individuals who have forgotten the sacrifices of former generations. But we must not worry, for if we stand strong, as Union soldiers of the Civil War did, and remember Lincoln's words, we can have faith that our republic works for the people, for each and every person. American democracy is unique in its resilience, while other states have continually failed, we have preserved and prospered. But, we are

not infallible, we can make mistakes, and have surly made them in the past. What is important is that we



stand up for ourselves, for the people. Today there is continued talk of an economic stimulus, an attempt for our government to return our nation to a state of economic security, for a government must work for the people, it

must insure that all individuals proper. As this plan is drafted we must trust our government to work in the interest of the people, for it is we who elected these individuals to high office and it is we with the power to take it away. Even if we did not vote for those in power, even if we disagree with them, we must not forget that the government works for us, for all of us, just as President Lincoln worked not only for the Republicans of the north, not only for the whole of the Union, but he worked to save the white men of the south from themselves, and the slaves of the south from the clutches of servitude. It is this notion: that the government of the United States works in the interest of every citizen of the United States, regardless of race, creed, age or affiliation of any kind, that has allowed our democracy to thrive for



the last two centuries. It is this that defines us as Americans, it is this that we ourselves must not forget and must not hesitate to remind our elected representatives of. The tests we face today are not the same as those our Republic faced in the 1860's, today there is no physical border be-

tween the differing sides of opinion, today we stand at a precipice, slowly moving our way towards the evils of class-warfare and extremism. Today's problems, just as those of the past, have the ability to split our country. But we cannot make ourselves enemies, for the government of the United States represents a united people, and while Lincoln has passed, his words live on in every moment that we cease to think solely as individuals and think, and more importantly act as a group. The Civil War changed the United States, today it stands both as a reminder of our vulnerability, as well as our strength in the face of adversity. If we are to continue to live as we have: prosperous and free, we must not allow the relative ease of partisan politics to overtake us, for Lincoln's

wisdom tells us to act otherwise, to make difficult decisions in order to benefit the greater good. At the same time Lincoln was careful to keep the Republic from falling into the



trenches of tyranny, he was cordial, respectful of the opinions of the minority. So let us heed his calls, - let us, we the people, be those who bring upon the rebirth of the ideas of the revolution, the rebirth of the words of Lincoln, words to be echoed across our nation, that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from this earth.



Union Dead to be Reinterred in Arizona on May 16th, 2009

The remains of 70 soldiers buried between 1862 & 1878 were discovered during a construction project in downtown Tucson, AZ The 14 Union soldiers were California Volunteer Infantry & Cavalry that were part of the famed 'California Column' - most are unknown. The bulk of the recovered soldiers were U.S. Regulars serving in Arizona between 1866-78, with most of them identified. The remains will be moved by escorted military convoy from Tucson to the Southern Arizona Vets Memorial Cemetery in Sierra Vista, Fri. 15 May. On Sat. 16 May, the soldiers will be buried in an elaborate ceremony in a special cemetery set aside exclusively for them. Vets, SUVCW members, & Civil War & Indian War re-enactors are encouraged to attend. Event organizers are still accepting volunteers to serve as pall-bearers. Brothers interested in attending or serving as pall-bearers are urged to contact the undersigned for more information.
