With Thanksgiving now behind us and Christmas looming straight ahead, it will not be long before we find ourselves in a new year. As the activity level increases in preparation for Christmas and New years celebrations take a moment, pause, and reflect on the "reason for

the season" and I hope that gives you the peace and the contentment that is intended at this time. These are emotions probably not enjoyed by our Union ancestors in the stark winters 1861 through 1864. You might be interested to know that a great many of the traditions that we enjoy today were also observed by your veteran ancestor. Decorated Christmas trees, Christmas caroling, exchanging of gifts and even the modern im-

age of Santa Claus was common to the populace and to the military. Despite the wartime reality of the military camps and units, efforts were made to alleviate those conditions and improve upon morale by allowing a degree of observance. Trees would be cut and decorated and placed for all to enjoy. At times, the quality

and serving of meals reflected the comfort associated with a traditional Christmas dinner. Many received gifts from home. For many, however, it was not a time of joy. Southern parents told their children that, due to the Yankee blockade, Santa might not be able to deliver his

> presents. Several great battles, Fredericksburg, Virginia and Savannah, Georgia, took place just at Christmas time. Many families had suffered the loss of a son, a father or the loss of property and livelihood. What I come to admire is that strength and the resolve of these folks to continue the fight and to preserve our Union.



Christmas During The Civil War

It can be difficult to relate to the men and women of the Civil War era. Despite the extraordinarily different circumstances in which they found themselves, however, we can connect with our forebears in traditions such as the celebration of Christmas. By the mid-19th century, most of today's familiar Christmas trappings — Christmas carols, gift giving and tree decoration — were already in place. Charles Dickens had published "A Christmas Carol" in 1843 and indeed, the Civil War saw the first introductions to the modern image of a jolly and portly Santa Claus through the drawings of Thomas Nast, a German-speaking immigrant.




Civil War soldiers in camp and their families at home drew comfort from the same sorts of traditions that characterize Christmas today. Alfred Bellard of the 5th New Jersey noted, "In order to make it look much like Christmas as possible, a small tree was stuck up in front of our tent, decked off with hard tack and pork, in lieu of cakes and oranges, etc." John Haley, of the 17th Maine, wrote in his diary on Christmas Eve that, "It is rumored that there are sundry boxes and mysterious parcels over at Stoneman's Station directed to us. We retire to sleep with feelings akin to those of children expecting Santa Claus."

In one amusing anecdote, a Confederate prisoner relates how the realities of war intruded on his Christmas celebrations: "A friend had sent me in a package a bottle of old brandy. On Christmas morning I quietly called several comrades up to my bunk to taste the precious fluid of... DISAPPOINTMENT! The bottle had been opened outside, the brandy taken and replaced with water...and sent in. I hope the Yankee who played that practical joke lived to repent it and was shot before the war ended." For many, the holiday was a reminder of the profound melancholy that had settled over the entire nation. Southern parents warned their children that Santa might not make it through the blockade, and soldiers in bleak winter quarters were reminded, more acutely than ever, of the domestic bliss they had left behind. Robert Gould Shaw, who would later earn glory as the commander of the 54th Massachusetts, recorded in his diary, "It is Christmas morning and I hope a happy and merry one for you all, though it looks so stormy for our poor country, one can hardly be in merry humor." On the Confederate home front, Sallie Brock Putnam of Richmond echoed Shaw's sentiment: "Never before had so sad a Christmas dawned

upon us...We had neither the heart nor inclination to make the week merry with joyousness when such a sad calamity hovered over us." For the people of Fredericksburg, Virginia, which had been battered only a matter of days before Christmas, or Savannah, Georgia, which General Sherman had presented to President Lincoln as a gift, the holiday season brought the war to their very doorsteps. Christmas during the Civil War served both as an escape from and a reminder of the awful conflict rending the country in two. Soldiers looked forward to a day of rest and relative relaxation, but had their moods tempered by the thought of separation from their loved ones. At home, families did their best to celebrate the holiday, but wondered when the vacant chair would again be filled.





Civil War Terms

Gabions: (pronounced *gey-bee-en*) Cylindrical wicker baskets which were filled with rocks and dirt, often used to build field fortifications or temporary fortified positions.

Greenbacks: Paper currency which began to circulate in the North after February 1862 with the passage of the Legal Tender Act. The bills were called "greenbacks" because of their color.

This Month in The Civil War

Nov. 6,1860.. **ABRAHAM LINCOLN** is elected the 16th President of the United States. Before his inauguration, seven states will secede.

Nov.8,1861...The Union Navy stops 2 Confederate diplomats sailing for England. The British government demands their release. Lincoln states "one war at a time" and ends a diplomatic standoff by releasing them.

Nov.7,1862...President Lincoln has grown impatient with McClellan's "lack of attack" after Antietam. He mentions to Mac "if you don't want to use the army, I should like to borrow it for awhile."

Nov.19,1863... "Gettysburg Address." Pres. Lincoln stuns his audience and burns his simple speech into U.S. history while dedicating the Soldiers National Cemetery at the former battlefield in Pennsylvania.

Nov.23-25,1863..."BATTLE OF CHATTANOOGA:" Gen. Grant defeats CSA Gen. Braxton Bragg at Chattanooga, TN ending the 2 month siege.

Nov.8,1864...Pres Abraham Lincoln is reelected by a landslide even carrying the states of Tennessee and Louisiana. His opponent is his former Union commanding General George B. McClellan with the Democratic "Peace" Party. The first time soldiers vote "from the field."

Nov.15,1864..."THE SAVANNAH CAMPAIGN:" Gen. William T. Sherman leaves captured Atlanta after convincing Grant and Lincoln he can "break" his supply lines in Georgia and march his army to the coast living off the land. The Union army will cut a swath of destruction through the heart of the confederacy, burning farms and fields and any supplies they cannot take on their march.

Our Camp now has it's own Facebook page! Thanks to my daughter, Emily Hope Allyn, who set it up and made it a reality. In Facebook (FB) protocol she made it a, "Club/closed group"; meaning you have to join it by submitting a "request." If you have a Facebook page this is an easy process: from your FB page go to our page; **Sons of Union Veterans Pittenger Camp 21,** then locate the "**JOIN**" (this group) button, push it - which will send me a message to add you to our page. You will get a "request sent" response on your computer/tablet/smartphone, then after I add you to our group page you will get a notification. You **do** have to have a FB page to join but you don't have to be on FB to view content on our page.

A word about internet security: many people have expressed concern and even some fear of social media (such as Facebook) and I respect those concerns. That is why our Camp has no requirement to join Facebook and we have no plans to use only Facebook to send our brothers news of interest, etc. The General will still continue to be our principal means of reporting with email as the main means of getting pressing news disseminated.
