On April 9th, 2011, following the Civil War Sesquicentennial public event at Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery (SRRC), members of the Rural Cemetery Preservation Committee gathered to receive a check in the amount of \$500 from representatives of Ivy Stiers Auxiliary 23 and Ellsworth Camp 23. The payment was made as a grant to the Rural Cemetery Cannon Fund. This fund was established by the Committee to receive donations to offset costs for the two replica cannons placed in the GAR Memorial last November 11th.

Camp 23 has worked closely with the Rural Cemetery Preservation Committee to assist with the rehabilitation of the memorial over the years. Many of the decorative elements in the memorial fell victim to the scrap metal drives in World War II. Among the losses were cannon balls that decorated the coping, a flag pole and Spanish-American War era artillery pieces.

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Annual Lincoln Dinner Includes Special Guest!

On Saturday, February 12, 2011, Camp 23 and Auxiliary 23 hosted our annual Lincoln Dinner at the Washoe House near Petaluma, celebrating the 202nd birthday of President Abraham Lincoln.

Twenty-five people attended the evening event, with guests including several members of the North Bay Civil War Round Table and the Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery Preservation Committee. Also joining us were Brothers Frank Avila (Camp 4), Tad Campbell (Camp 4), and Jeff Vaillant (Camp 24).

After dinner, attendees were invited to recount their favorite story about President Lincoln. Many rose to share their stories, but the most noteworthy of all storytellers was Abe Lincoln himself (alias **Roger Vincent**), who with **Colleen Vincent** (looking every bit the part of Mary Todd Lincoln), honored us with his first appearance at one of our dinners.

The annual Lincoln Dinner at the Washoe House has become a tradition with our Camp and Auxiliary. The place itself played a part in local Civil War history, when militia marching north from Petaluma in 1865 – bent on attacking parts of Santa Rosa as punishment for their highly vocal anti-Union sympathies – stopped at this watering hole to refresh themselves. After a few cool libations, the troops decided to call off the attack and returned home. We, too, returned home after another wonderful evening at the Washoe House.

The Civil War - A 150 Year Commemoration

Ellsworth Camp 23 and Ivy Stiers Auxiliary 23 kicked off the beginning of the Civil War Sesquicentennial in a big way this year, collaborating with Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery to host one of the largest events in the history of our Camp.

The event took place on April 9th (the day Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomattox Court House in 1865). The event began at 12:30 p.m. with a rose planting ceremony, organized by the Rural Cemetery "Rose Brigade," at the grave of Lt-Col. John Gotea Pressley. At 1:00 p.m., Chuck Seekamp and his artillery crew fired "Dixie," their Napoleon-style cannon, to draw people's attention to the main ceremony at the GAR Memorial. There, master of ceremonies Bill Montgomery welcomed the crowd of about 250 attendees. After a few




Commander's Corner

Remembering Our Past by Dean Enderlin



LAKE COUNTY'S CIVIL WAR FORT

Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted from the compiled works of Henry Mauldin, who devoted many years of his life to researching and documenting Lake County History. This excerpt was written 12 October 1958. Jerusalem Valley is located a few miles southeast of Lower Lake in Lake County, CA. Source: Mauldin collection pages 6866-6868, "Jerusalem Valley and Jerusalem Valley Fort."

About one half mile south of where the road crossed Soda Creek in Jerusalem Valley and one fourth mile up and west from the stream is a slope nearly one half mile long from top to bottom. It is composed mostly of clay, is open country and contains a few small white oak. The old immigrant road runs through here that came from Middletown way to Jerusalem Valley.

In the middle of this slope is a neat little hill with an appearance as if it had been poured out of a sand bucket. On the top of this little hill is a natural formation of broken up rock which ranges from head to body size.

Pleasant Smith, George Bishop and others living nearby took advantage of this natural fortress like location and built themselves what is now known as Jerusalem Valley Fort.

Instead of building a wall around a single enclosure they dug a series of fox holes. There still shows four well defined holes, each about five feet across and three feet down. Another half dozen less perfect holes show work.

From this vantage point it was down hill in every direction and men in the fort had a good view in all directions. With two men to a hole, back to back, hid behind these rock barricades it would have taken a small army to have dislodged them.

In this fort they stored necessary supplies, such as powder, lead for bullets, and other items to withstand a siege, each family furnishing a share.

The Civil War ended. No attempt was made by government to force any of the men to enter the conflict, therefore the fort was never put to use. After all danger of being drafted was over, the supplies were divided back to the original donors and Jerusalem Valley Fort was abandoned. A living descendant of one of the parties remembers as a boy in helping to cut up the remains of a lead brick which had been stored in the fort. The intention had originally been to melt it down for running bullets but its final [use] was having it cut up in small pieces as shot in a muzzle loading shotgun.

It has been reported that another fort, for the same purpose, was built principally by the Mathews and Copseys in Excelsior Valley on the old Doc Mathews place now belonging to Mrs. Luella Adamson. Its location, if it existed, is a mystery.

As far as is known there is no other fort, works, building nor establishment in Lake County that had to [do] with the Civil War. Until someone comes forward with such information all Civil War honors go to Jerusalem Valley Fort.

WESLEY FLETCHER SWIFT Co. E, 3rd Iowa Cavalry

Why does a 16 year-old leave his family farm in Missouri to join the cavalry regiment from Iowa temporarily encamped near Rolla, Missouri? Did duty and honor drive his decision? Was he a teenage boy seeking the adventure that would surely come his way in the cavalry? Had he heard stories about his great grandfather, Thomas Selby, who served in 1st Co., Middle Battalion, Maryland Militia in the Revolutionary War? Or could it be as simple as the necessity of providing for his family due to the fact that his father had died in 1856 when he was 10 years old, leaving his mother to care for him and his four siblings? I have absolutely no idea! However, I do know that my 3rd great grandfather, Wesley Fletcher Swift did just that, enlisting in Co. E, 3rd Iowa Cavalry on 1 August 1862.

Under the command of General Vandever, Wesley accompanied Captain Spencer in the pursuit of Confederate Major General Marmaduke beginning 25 April 1863. Of course, this excursion proved futile as Major General Marmaduke had the distinction of being captured on 25 October 1864 by James Dunlavy, a Private in Co. D, 3rd Iowa Cavalry. Wesley re-



enlisted as a Veteran on 1 January 1864 and was promoted to full bugler on 1 March 1864.

On 7 June 1864 Wesley was severely wounded during an engagement near Ripley, Mississippi as the Union troops, commanded by General John Sturgis, retreated from Brice's Cross Roads after tangling with an inferior number of Confederates under the command of General Nathan Bedford Forrest. Wesley spent the rest of June and July 1864 in Overton Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee. After rejoining his unit, he continued to serve in Co. E, 3rd Iowa Cavalry, being mustered out 9 August 1865 in Atlanta, Georgia.

Following the war, Wesley returned to Boone County, Missouri, and later removed to Cooke, Texas where he met and married Lucretia Ann Gabriel on 29 September 1876. To this union were born four children (three daughters, Cora, Agnes and Susannah, and one son, my 2nd great grandfather, Theodore). Before the birth of their youngest child, Susannah, Wesley and Lucretia moved their family to Chickasaw Nation, Indian Territory, which combined with Oklahoma Territory to form the state of Oklahoma in 1907. I was proud to have them documented as a First Family of the Twin Territories on 15 January 2011. Wesley Fletcher Swift died at the age of 83 on 10 June 1930 in Pryor, Oklahoma.

Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery Sesquicentennial Event by Cindy Eddy

On April 12, 1861 the Civil War began at Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina. Almost 150 years later, on Saturday, April 9, 2011, Ivy Stiers Auxiliary 23 joined forces with SUVCW Ellsworth Camp 23, local reenactors of the ACWA & NCWA, Sons of Confederate Veterans and the SRRC Preservation Committee to participate in a commemoration of the sesquicentennial of the Civil War.

The event, held at the Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery, drew a crowd of over two hundred and fifty people and was the brainchild of our very own **Charles Christian**, PCC. With the help of many others, including CC **Dean Enderlin** and **Lou Olker**, who assisted with the organization of information and the coordination of personnel, this idea became a reality.

During the program, SUV Chaplain **Charles Christian** gave the benediction and CC **Dean Enderlin** delivered an eloquent speech about the Civil War. All available SUV Camp 23 men were deployed as they served in the rifle squad or represented veterans at the gravesites.

Eight Auxiliary 23 members pitched in to participate in this historical event while dressed in Civil War period attire. All the ladies worked together to set up the Auxiliary's information booth and – not to be outdone by the SUV/SCV table which was covered in blue cloth and a lace overlay with an artistic fresh flower arrangement – the ladies decorated their table in red cloth trimmed with red, white and blue bunting for a very patriotic look.

Tanya Gjerman, Katherine Cannon and Ann Schleeter, PAP, staffed the Auxiliary booth which provided information and offered for donation, "hardtack" sugar cookies, thumbprint cookies, patriotic star cookies, bottled ice water, patriotic notepads and beautiful handmade red, white and blue woven bookmarks. Through straight donations and items offered for donation, the Auxiliary received a total of \$100.72 which made this an extremely successful first fund raising event for the Ivy Stiers Auxiliary!!!

Patriotic Points

THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

For more than a century, Americans have recited the Pledge of Allegiance as a promise of loyalty to the United States. When saying the Pledge, all should stand at attention and face the flag. The U.S. Flag Code advises that those not in uniform should place the right hand over the heart. Those not in uniform who are wearing a nonreligious hat should remove it with the right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, so that the hand is over the heart. Soldiers and others in uniform (such as scouts) should remain silent, face the flag, and give the appropriate salute.

The Pledge of Allegiance was first published in September 1892 in a magazine called the *Youth's Companion*. The magazine printed it to help celebrate the four hundredth anniversary of Columbus reaching America. Schoolchildren first recited the pledge on Columbus Day, October 12, 1892. The original words read: "I pledge of allegiance to my Flag and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

The words were altered in the early 1920s to change "my flag" to "the flag of the United States of America." In 1942 the Pledge received official recognition by Congress when it was included in the U.S. Flag Code. Congress added the phrase "under God" in 1954.

Francis Bellamy, a clergyman and editor at the *Youth's Companion*, is believed to have written the Pledge of Allegiance. In the 1930s some people suggested that James B. Upham, who also worked at the magazine, was the author. By the time the question arose, both men were deceased. In 1939 a panel of scholars gave credit to Bellamy.

From the SUVCW *Ritual and Ceremonials*, (revised Aug. 2006):

"Whenever the United States Flag is passing or being passed in a formal matter, as on parade, members of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, not in military uniform, will salute the Flag by removing their hat or cap; the head dress being held in the right hand opposite the left shoulder; right forearm against the breast. When not wearing a head cover, the right hand will be placed over the heart. This will not apply when the Flag is flying from a staff, but only when supported by a color bearer. When giving the pledge of allegiance, stand with the right hand over the heart."

words about Sonoma County's history during the Civil War, Bill passed the microphone to Camp 23 Chaplain **Charles Christian**, PCC, who delivered the benediction and directed the attention of the crowd to **Mary Lou Christian** (pictured at right) and **Marilyn Lane** who sat nearby representing the widows and mothers of all those who did not return home from the war. **Roger Vincent** (portraying Abraham Lincoln) followed, fittingly choosing words from Lincoln's first inaugural address.

Camp 23 Commander **Dean Enderlin** delivered an address to the crowd summarizing the war and recounting a history of the Grand Army of the Republic, United Confederate Veterans, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, and Sons of Confederate Veterans. Three-volley rifle salutes followed, alternating between two squads (one Union and one Confederate). Camp 23 members assisting with the Union rifles were **Jamin Gjerman**, **Brian Pinarretta** and **Ron Cannon**, PCC, while **Roger Fernwood** "galvanized" to assist with the Confederate rifles. At the conclusion of the rifle salute, "Dixie" fired one round from the hill above the assembly, and **Mace Gjerman** rendered Taps.



Free public tours of the cemetery were offered after the main ceremony, featuring presentations at the graves of two Civil War nurses, five Union veterans, and five Confederate veterans. Camp 23 and Auxiliary 23 volunteers at these stations were: CC **Dean Enderlin** (Col. James B. Armstrong, US), **Roger Fernwood** (Capt. James S. Austin, CS), **Ron Cannon**, PCC (Sgt. Thomas M. Goodman, US), **Brian Pinarretta** (Capt. Charles H. Barton, US) assisted by **Morgan Pinarretta**, **Elaine Christian** (Nurse Sarah A. Barton) assisted by **Cali Debevoise**, AP **Cindy Eddy** (Nurse

Ivy Stiers), Jamin Gjerman (Cpl. Augustus L. Fisher, US) assisted by Michelle Hansen, Lou Olker (Lt.-Col. John G. Pressley, CS), and Mace Gjerman (Pvt. John W. Clanton, CS). Leading each of the five guided tours were Rural Cemetery volunteers Kay Voliva, Rebekah Thomas, Kristen Skold, Bill Northcrop and Bill Montgomery.

Both Camp 23 and Auxiliary 23 staffed an information table, offering baked goods and other items, as well as information on our organizations. Staffing the table were **Tanya Gjerman**, **Katherine Cannon**, **Ann Schleeter**, **Tiana Gjerman**, and **Allen Davis**. (See page 11 for more details from the Auxiliary).

About the SUVCW

The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War is a patriotic and educational organization, similar to the Grand Army of the Republic. It was founded on November 12, 1881 and incorporated by Act of Congress August 20, 1954. The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War is the legal heir to and representative of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Colonel Elmer Ellsworth Camp No. 23 of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) was named after the original Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) Post in Santa Rosa, which in turn was named for Col. Elmer Ephraim Ellsworth (1837-1861). The current Camp was organized in 1996, and was originally a provisional Camp under the name "Col. Wesley Brainard Camp." Brother Steve Martin was the Commander during this provisional period. Col. Elmer Ellsworth Camp 23 was chartered on 20 March 1999.

The Camp serves Marin, Mendocino, and Sonoma counties, east of US 101, and Del Norte, Humboldt, Lake, & Napa counties (See map at right).
