## A QUICK CHANGE FOR AN EAGLE SCOUT CEREMONY

## VETERANS DAY - OUR VISIT TO THE GOLDEN GATE NATIONAL CEMETERY IN SAN FRANCISCO

Brother Gary Hormel stood at the grave of Captain Joseph Stewart, first commander of Fort Alcatraz, Brother Ken Felton stood at the grave of Union sailor Matthew Arther, and Brothers Steve Johnson and Robert Mayer stood at the monument to Civil War soldiers and sailors. There was not a great amount of visitors that day, but those who stopped listen to us were grateful for the information we shared with them.
